ABOUT THE AUSTRALASIAN MARCÉ SOCIETY

The Australasian Marcé Society for Perinatal Mental Health is a not-for-profit interdisciplinary organisation dedicated to supporting quality research and care for prenatal and postpartum mental health in/among mothers, fathers and their babies. The conference will provide a unique opportunity to facilitate an open and constructive dialogue between researchers, practitioners and consumers, based on evidence and practice, to foster a better understanding of perinatal mental health care and early parenting support. The Society was formed in the UK in 1980 and has a growing International membership.

Traditionally the Society's primary focus has been on mental illness related to childbearing. However, the interests of Australasian members often encompass broader areas, including the maternal-infant relationship, attachment theory, the psycho-biology of pregnancy, antenatal and postnatal education, psychosocial aspects of obstetrics, perinatal bereavement and all aspects of mental health of women and their families during pregnancy and the postnatal period.

ABOUT HELEN MAYO HOUSE

Helen Mayo House is a part of Perinatal and Infant Mental Health Services at the Women's and Children's Health (WCH) Network in Adelaide, which provides specialist care to perinatal families throughout South Australia. This includes consultation-liaison services to women birthing at the Women's and Children's Hospital as well as to infants receiving medical care within the nurseries and paediatric wards of the WCH network; education, advice and telehealth consultation state-wide; and inpatient care in Helen Mayo House where mothers with severe mental health disorders are co-admitted with their infants. Helen Mayo House was one of the first Mother-Baby Units established in Australia in the 1980s, and since 1993 has run an annual conference to promote education and skill development for health professionals working with perinatal families.

KEYNOTE SPEAKERS

Note: Online presentations



Dr. Cheryl Beck is a Distinguished Professor, School of Nursing, University of Connecticut, with a joint appointment in the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology at the School of Medicine. She received her Master's degree in maternal-newborn nursing and certificate in nurse-midwifery from Yale University and Doctor of Nursing Science from Boston University. Dr. Beck leads a research program focused on postpartum mood/anxiety disorders and posttraumatic stress disorder due to traumatic childbirth. She developed the widely-used Postpartum Depression Screening Scale (PDSS) and authored many of the seminal works in the field, from her 160+ journal articles. She also authored numerous books, including research methods textbooks for undergraduate and graduate nursing education, e.g. Essentials of Nursing Research. She was awarded Book of the Year from the American Journal of Nursing multiple times, including for Nursing Research: Generating and Assessing Evidence for Nursing Practice and Postpartum Mood and Anxiety Disorders: A Clinician's Guide. Her two latest books include Secondary Qualitative Data Analysis in the Health and Social Sciences and Introduction to Phenomenology: Focus on Methodology. She has received many prestigious honours including induction as a fellow of the American Academy of Nursing, and induction into the Sigma Theta Tau International Nurse Researcher Hall of Fame. Dr. Beck was awarded the Marcé Medal by the International Marcé Society for Perinatal Mental Health for the significant contributions of her research program.



Dr Louise Howard is Professor Emerita at the Institute of Psychiatry Psychology and Neuroscience, Kings College London. She was previously Professor in women's mental health and honorary consultant perinatal psychiatrist at the South London and Maudsley NHS Foundation Trust. Her research programs focus on women's mental health, and the impact of gendered violence on mental health, funded by NIHR, UKRI and charitable foundations. She has worked with policy makers to influence clinical practice including chairing the National Institute for Clinical Excellence Guideline Development Group on Antenatal and Postnatal Mental Health (CG192; 2014) and being a member of the WHO 2013 guidance on violence against women. She has won a number of prizes for her research including the International Marcé (perinatal mental health) Society's Marcé Medal, and was the first psychiatrist to win a prestigious National Institute for Health Research (NIHR) Professorship in 2013 followed by an NIHR Senior Investigator award in 2019. She is the immediate past President of the International Marcé(perinatal mental health) Society.

INVITED SPEAKERS



Dr Ashlesha Bagadia is a Perinatal Psychiatrist & Head of Psychotherapy at The Green Oak Initiative, which is a community mental health centre in Bangalore, India (www.thegreenoakinitiative.com). After completing basic medical training in India, she obtained basic psychiatry training in London, UK (MRCPsych) & advanced psychiatry training in Adelaide, Australia (FRANZCP). She then obtained a Fellowship in Perinatal Psychiatry & Women's Mental Health at University of Toronto, Canada. She holds a diploma in Family Systems Therapy and is a practitioner and supervisor of Mentalisation Based Treatment for Personality Disorder. Since moving back to India 8 years ago, she has been working closely with other perinatal clinicians in building awareness and establishing access to care in a still underdeveloped service. She leads a local perinatal mental health service called *Chiguru-thrive to 5* and runs group therapy programs for Borderline Personality Disorder and mothers with history of trauma. She also runs a psychotherapy training organisation called The PARC (www.theparc.in) where she trains and supervises therapists in advanced therapy skills and medical professionals in mental health skills. One of their flagship training programs is a short course on perinatal mental health for obstetricians, which is now being adapted in other parts of South Asia and South Africa.



Professor Catherine Chamberlain is a Palawa Trawlwoolway woman (Tasmania), Director of Onemda Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health and Wellbeing and Head of the Indigenous Health Equity Unit at the Melbourne School of Population and Global Health, The University of Melbourne. A Registered Midwife and Public Health researcher, her research aims to identify perinatal opportunities to improve health equity across the lifecourse for which she has received the Lowitja Research leadership award (2019) and CATSINAM fellowship (2022). She is inaugural Editor-In-Chief of First Nations Health and Wellbeing Lowitja Journal and Principal Investigator for two large multi-disciplinary projects – Healing the Past by Nurturing the Future – which aims to co-design support for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander parents experiencing complex trauma; and Replanting the Birthing Trees, which aims to transform intergenerational cycles of trauma to cycles of nurturing and recovery.



Tawera Ormsby descends from Ngāti Porou, no Reporua and Ngāpuhi, no Utakura, in Aotearoa, New Zealand. Tawera started working at Ohomairangi Trust 19 years ago as an administrator and has grown in her role as the organisation has grown. Since becoming a proud mother of 3 beautiful children, she has participated in, and now facilitates Mellow Bumps, Hoki ki te Rito/Mellow Parenting and Poipoia ngā mokopuna/First 1000 days within her local community in South Auckland and is passionate about the delivery and outcomes of these programmes.



Jane Fisher AO, an academic Clinical and Health Psychologist is Finkel Professor of Global Health in the School of Public Health and Preventive Medicine at Monash University. She maintains sessional clinical practice at Masada Private Hospital Early Parenting Centre. Jane has longstanding interests in the social determinants of perinatal mental health and wellbeing, and of how these can be addressed in prevention, health promotion and self-care strategies. Jane Fisher was President of the International Marcé Society for Perinatal Mental Health 2016 – 2018 and of the Australasian Marcé Society for Perinatal Mental Health 2007 – 2009.

In 2017, she was awarded the Marcé Medal, by the Australasian Marcé Society and in 2022 the International Marcé Society's John Cox Medal for having made an extraordinary contribution to expert knowledge in the field of perinatal mental health through research, clinical practice, teaching, and mentorship. In 2022 Jane Fisher was appointed Officer in the Order of Australia in the January 2019 Australia Day Honours for her contributions to perinatal mental health, women, and the community.



Dr Richard Fletcher is Associate Professor, Fathers and Families Research Program, School of Health Sciences, College of Health, Medicine and Wellbeing, The University of Newcastle, NSW. He has been conducting programs and research with fathers and families for over 20 years and was the convenor of the Australian Fatherhood Research Network for 10 years. His current research includes: Indigenous fathers' strengths; Fathers' role in families with PND; Father-infant attachment; eHealth and web-based support for fathers; and, Fathers' role in maternal mental health and in the event of stillbirth.



Professor Helen Herrman AO is Professor Emeritus of Psychiatry at Orygen and the Centre for Youth Mental Health, The University of Melbourne, and Director of the World Health Organization (WHO) Collaborating Centre in Mental Health, Melbourne. She is former president of the World Psychiatric Association (WPA – 2017-2020) and the International Association of Women's Mental Health. She has been appointed an Officer of the Order of Australia.

Her research and development interests as psychiatrist and public health physician include promoting mental health, community mental health care, and women's mental health. Previously she was Professor and Director of Psychiatry in St. Vincent's Health Melbourne, and for a year acted as regional advisor in mental health for the WHO's Western Pacific Region. She led the WPA's action plan 2017-2020, concerned with supporting the contribution of psychiatrists to global mental health. Publications include the report as chair of "The Lancet-WPA Commission: time for united action on depression" published in 2022.



Dr Nicole Milburn is a Clinical Psychologist who has worked in public and private settings for around 25 years and is currently in full time private practice, providing therapeutic services to infants, children, families and individual adults. She is the current Chair of the Boards of the Australian Association for Infant Mental Health and the Tweddle Foundation. Nicole specialises in relationship assessments that assist authorities to make decisions about the best interest of infants, children and young people and is very committed to representing the voice of the infant.

INVITED WORKSHOP PRESENTERS



Dr Jackie Amos is a clinician and researcher, with over twenty years' experience in New Zealand and South Australia. She has worked as a senior child and adolescent psychiatrist in CAMHS (Child Adolescent Mental Health Service) and more recently in the non-government sector. Her psychotherapeutic practice has focused on working with children and families to disrupt intergenerational cycles of trauma and disadvantage. In her doctoral research Jackie developed a clinically informative model, outlining how childhood experiences of abuse and neglect, beginning in infancy, are transmitted across generations. The place of shame in attachment disorganisation, the controlling adaptations to early disorganisation in middle childhood and the states of mind of adults struggling with parenting is central to the model. This model has been used to predict the fundamental objectives of effective interventions for families caught in these distressing intergenerational cycles.

This body of work now informs service delivery in the Children's Service Unit, Centacare (a large non-government agency) where psychotherapy and social casework have been integrated, to offer trauma responsive therapeutic casework. This integrated model has been used successfully to address families interfacing with the child protection system, including in family reunification. Training materials are being developed, based on Jackie's PhD, to support the integration of trauma responsive interventions across programmes at Centacare.



Liz Coventry is a child and adolescent psychiatrist who worked in Helen Mayo House for 7 years. They have recently taken up a new role, as part of a team, developing a comprehensive therapeutic framework and training that will inform the work of Centacare, a large non-government agency. This work is drawing on their solid background in perinatal and infant mental health. They have a particular interest in complex relational trauma, how this impacts all members of a family system and the development and implementation of effective interventions.



Lauren Keegan is a perinatal psychologist with extensive experience in perinatal and infant mental health. She has worked with perinatal clients and their families for over a decade in the public and private sectors. She is an accredited Marte Meo Therapist and Trainer.



Dr Ros Powrie is a Perinatal Infant Child and Adolescent Psychiatrist who has worked for over 30 years in public health and 20 years in the PIMHS service at Womens and Childrens Hospital Adelaide. She first taught mindfulness based programs to women in pregnancy in 2010 and more recently teaches with midwives an adaptation of Mindfulness based Childbirth and Parenting (MBCP) as well as being on the International Teaching Faculty during 2022. She also teaches Mindful Self Care programs for health professionals. She is past president of AAIMH SA branch and a member since 1999, and a former National Board Member.

Workshop A: "My mother groaned, my father wept, into the dangerous world I leapt." - W Blake.

Mind in Labour Mind in Life - an antenatal mindfulness program for parents to be

Description: What is it that we want parents to learn about pregnancy, birth and becoming a parent to give them

and their baby a head start in this transformative time of life? What may need to learnt and possibly "unlearnt" in order for them to "do differently and "be with differently" regarding the physical,

psychological and social changes and expectations in this most important time of life.

This workshop will introduce participants to the aims, core teaching and practices of Mind in Labour Mind in Life (MILMIL) a version of Mindfulness Based Childbirth and Parenting (MBCP) developed by Nancy Bardacke -midwife and mindfulness teacher more than 20 years ago. MILMIL is a 5 week online program (adapted during the pandemic) for couples and singles with a face to face weekend intensive and post birth re-union. It has been very positively received amongst birthing parents at WCH as well as showing promise in reducing anxiety, stress and depression scores, reducing fear of childbirth and increasing overall satisfaction in the birthing experience. Participants will be invited into the classroom and gain experiential learning as well as information on the core childbirth class modules which are taught through a mindfulness lens. Research in MBCP over the last 10 years is promising not only in reducing maternal stress and depression but also outcomes for infants, and possibly non birthing parents as well- this will be briefly discussed. Please wear loose comfortable clothing and footwear.

Workshop B: Mentalisation skills for the perinatal period

Description: Mentalisation based treatment (MBT) has strong evidence for management of people with personality

disorder, and emerging evidence for other conditions such as depression, trauma & eating disorders, all of which have a risk of destabilisation in the perinatal period. Application of MBT skills can be valuable in engaging, educating and building trust in this elusive population. This workshop will give an overview of non-mentalising modes in the perinatal period and key strategies to approach the

same.

Workshop C: When the bough breaks: The impact of traumatic birth (note: live virtual presentation)

Description: Up to 45% of new mothers report their births to have been traumatic. The workshop starts with

describing from the mothers' perspectives exactly what it is about a birth that can be viewed as so traumatic. This workshop brings visibility to the often invisible experience of women struggling with the ever widening ripple effects of traumatic childbirth. These ripples include birth trauma's impact on posttraumatic stress, mother-infant interaction, breastfeeding, the anniversary of the traumatic birth, and subsequent childbirth. In this workshop each of these ripples, or long-term consequences, are addressed by means of the findings from a series of qualitative research. The prevalence and risk factors for traumatic childbirth are also identified. The possibility of women experiencing

posttraumatic growth due to their struggles with birth trauma is highlighted. Implications for practice

and future research are included.

Workshop D: Attachment disorganisation: shame and fright without solution?

Description: The accepted understanding of attachment disorganisation is that infants must contend with fright

without solution, without relational support from a sensitive and responsive caregiver. In this workshop, the presenters will provide a comprehensive account of the research, that leads to the hypothesis that 'shame without solution' is as important as 'fright without solution', when considering traumatising attachment-caregiving relationships in infancy. The areas of research that will be reviewed will include a general overview of shame, the importance of shame in the development of healthy boundaries and the more controversial idea that young infants can experience shame. Using an evolutionary lens, the presenters will also examine adaptations to unresolved fear and shame in middle childhood and the persistence of these patterns into adulthood. An exploration of two social styles that support the resolution of within group tension in social mammals will be used to understand the adaptive purpose of power based relational patterns that disrupt parent infant relationships. How this supports a compassionate understanding of parents who struggle to care for their infants, despite their deep desire to break intergenerational patterns, and how this informs practice will conclude the workshop.

Workshop E: Introducing Marte Meo: Strengthening parent-infant attachment through everyday

Description: Learn about the Marte Meo Method: an attachment-based approach to supporting everyday

interactions between parents and their infant or toddler.

'Marte Meo' was developed in Holland by Maria Aarts and is translated from Latin as "on one's own strength." This strengths-based approach helps parents learn really practical, concrete ways of interacting with their children that strengthens the relationship and supports development.

Marte Meo is a video-based method for providing information about how to support development in daily interactions. The focus is on the importance of communication (both verbal and non-verbal) in

building relationships and emotional connections.

In this workshop participants will learn the foundational concepts of Marte Meo with a focus on positive leading and following and its practical applications across a range of settings including perinatal mental health, child and family health, neonatal nursing and early childhood settings. Video recordings of parent-child interactions will be used to demonstrate the core concepts and show everyday moments of interaction. This will provide clinicians with practical information to pass on to families they work which will strengthen relationships and support infant development. It also encourages clinicians to reflect on the way they interact with infants and children in their clinical practice and how we can model supportive interaction moments to caregivers.
